1 ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: The meeting is called to order at 4:36 p.m. 2 3 Before we begin our meeting, I ask that everyone please take a moment to silence their 4 5 cellphones. Thank you. 6 7 Will the Clerk please read the Sen. 8 Byron Baer Open Public Meetings Act. 9 MS. RODRIGUEZ: In accordance with 10 Section 5 of the Sen. Byron Baer Open Public Meetings 11 Act, adequate notice of this meeting has been provided in the Annual Notice Schedule, which 12 13 contained the time, date, and location of this 14 meeting, copies of which Notices were forwarded to 15 the official County newspapers, to wit: The Herald 16 News and The Record, and a copy of which was posted 17 on the bulletin board in the Bergen County Justice 18 Center and Administration Building, One Bergen County Plaza, Hackensack, New Jersey, and filed with the 19 20 Office of the Bergen County Clerk. 21 ROLL CALL 22 ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: Will the 23 Clerk please call the roll. (At this point in the proceeding roll 24 25 call is taken with Freeholders Amoroso, Ganz, Voss,

1 Silna Zur, and Acting Chairwoman Ortiz present, with Freeholder Tanelli and Chairman Sullivan absent.) 2 ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: Evidence of a 3 4 quorum is present. 5 PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: Will you all 6 7 please rise for the Pledge of Allegiance. 8 County Executive, would you like to 9 lead us. 10 COUNTY EXECUTIVE TEDESCO: Oh, thank 11 you, Vice-Chairwoman. 12 Ladies and gentlemen, please join me in 13 honoring America. 14 (At this point in the proceeding all 15 rise for a recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance, 16 led by County Executive Tedesco.) 17 REMARKS BY COUNTY EXECUTIVE RE: RESOLUTION #712-18 18 AND MEDICAL EXAMINER'S OFFICE 19 ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: At this time 20 I would like to invite our County Executive to say a 21 few words regarding Resolution #712-18, recognizing July as "Parks and Recreation Month." 22 23 COUNTY EXECUTIVE TEDESCO: Thank you, Chairwoman. 24 25 I just came back from doing an

1	interview with Steve Adubato about the Care Fair, so
2	it was wonderful that we're continuing to get
3	wonderful exposure. I know the director is here, and
4	he's the one that deserves much of the credit. While
5	I get to go on TV and talk about it, he's the one
6	that actually deserves the credit, but we're here to
7	talk about parks and recreation.
8	So, before I go into some remarks I
9	have, I just want to say how much appreciation I have
10	to the members of this Board for supporting the
11	vision that I have for the parks and recreation,
12	really for parks, we'll talk about the recreation
13	piece in a second, and supporting the vision that I
14	have for expanding on the parks that we have here.
15	You've all been so supportive, and I
16	thank you so much for that support and the wonderful
17	things that we've done in parks. And while there's
18	some that may question parks and its value, there's
19	no question in my mind about parks and the value they
20	provide to the nearly one million people that live
21	here, and, really, the hundreds of thousands that
22	take advantage of the parks throughout the year.
23	So I'm proud to celebrate Parks and
24	Recreation Month in Bergen County. Bergen County
25	parks are a place that belong to everyone, places

1 where everyone is welcome. Enjoying open space and recreation 2 3 makes us healthier, both physically and mentally, and 4 contributes to our quality of life. For many of our residents, the county parks are the primary way they 5 interact with county government. 6 7 Generations of families have made 8 memories at the Bergen County Zoo, and I can attest 9 to that, because my grandchildren are now the fourth 10 generation of Tedescos who have enjoyed the zoo at 11 Van Saun Park in Paramus, which will open a new exhibit this Friday, the Budgies exhibit. 12 13 The Budgies exhibit is an exhibit where 14 you have some type of stick or something that you can 15 hold in your hand that has birdseed on it, and you go 16 into an area, the birds then are flying around, and 17 they come and land on the stick and they eat off the 18 stick while you're sitting there enjoying the birds. It's a fantastic, wonderful, interactive exhibit, and 19 20 that will open this Friday. 21 FREEHOLDER SILNA ZUR: What time? COUNTY EXECUTIVE TEDESCO: We will get 22 23 it out to you. We're trying to work it all out so we 24 get the young children out and it's a time where it works for everybody, but we will get that out 25

1	publicly.
2	Schoolchildren learn about prehistoric
3	predators at the Field Station: Dinosaurs at Overpeck
4	Park. For the last two years, we've had a contract
5	with "Field Station: Dinosaurs," and I'm happy to say
6	that we're looking at completing the agreement with
7	them where they'll move to their new location across
8	the street, as I say, and that we'll be able to
9	permanently give them a home, where now they're in an
10	open field, and it will actually be in a wonderful
11	setting that will enhance the exhibit.
12	You can ski or snowboard at Campgaw,
13	and walk across the street in summer and play a round
14	of golf. Not many places in the State of New Jersey
15	can you do that.
16	You can also go and listen to live
17	music at the Wortendyke Barn.
18	For six magical weeks, you can enjoy
19	skating, meet Santa Claus and Mrs. Claus, and enjoy
20	some holiday treats at Winter Wonderland at Van Saun
21	Park. Not only for six magical weeks do you see the
22	holiday side, but then for the rest of the winter
23	through January, you can ice skate at Van Saun County
24	Park.
25	I'm proud of the experiences we're

1 providing our residents across nearly the 10,000 acres of parkland from Mahwah to North Arlington, and 2 3 this is about making the parks accessible to 4 everyone, to allow everyone to be able to use the 5 parks, but use them all year round and give people an opportunity, when most of the time you don't have the 6 7 ability or the weather is not so favorable, to be 8 able to go out to a park in the wintertime and enjoy 9 it, to bring your family out to make it a family 10 environment, and so that's one of the things that 11 we're doing. 12 We're creating a future for the parks. 13 We're looking at ways to make the parks better. 14 Proud that we just offered a new recreational 15 opportunity for people at Overpeck Park, a new type 16 of game that comes in a jar -- I mean --17 FREEHOLDER SILNA ZUR: Really? 18 FREEHOLDER AMOROSO: Comes in a ball. 19 COUNTY EXECUTIVE TEDESCO: That gives 20 people the opportunity to play a sport that we 21 haven't had here, and now there's six courts where people can come. I was there and spoke and talked 22 23 and actually played. 24 FREEHOLDER AMOROSO: Did you? 25 COUNTY EXECUTIVE TEDESCO: I did.

10 1 FREEHOLDER AMOROSO: How did you do? COUNTY EXECUTIVE TEDESCO: I won't 2 3 comment on that, but I was able to walk away and my back didn't hurt. 4 5 But people not only from Bergen County came, people from other counties were there because 6 7 they heard about it and they don't have it. 8 I do want to say that I was at a 9 community here in northern Bergen County that has 10 pickleball, and, lo and behold, it's the same surface as the surface that we have. 11 12 FREEHOLDER VOSS: Wow! 13 ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: Really? 14 FREEHOLDER GANZ: Really? 15 COUNTY EXECUTIVE TEDESCO: Really. 16 So, again, it's something else. 17 I'm also very happy that you all 18 supported the commitment that the voters made years ago about the Open Space Trust Fund and we were able 19 20 to restore that back to the one penny or the \$0.01, 21 which now gives us much more opportunity to do many, many more things, along with municipalities, because 22 23 there's more money now for municipalities to do bigger and better projects. So I thank the 24 25 Freeholder Board for supporting that.

11 1 I believe by strengthening our parks' system, we're strengthening the county. 2 I did say that I'll talk a little bit 3 4 about recreation. So the component I don't believe 5 we've done enough of is the recreation aspect, and, you know, you saw that with the pickleball, right? 6 7 So, one of the things that's we're 8 going to look forward to in 2019 and beyond is 9 working on the recreation component to parks and 10 recreation to actually look at what do we want to do 11 as a legislative body to provide more recreational opportunities. And while that's part of the big plan 12 that we have, it will be something that I think we 13 want, we'll take a look at in detail and start to 14 15 look at it and say: How do we look at providing some 16 more recreational opportunities? 17 I also want to give you an update on 18 the duck pond. You all know that last year we 19 started to come up with a plan to address the duck 20 pond in Ridgewood as part of the Saddle River Park 21 system. I spoke with the director, he's met with the DEP now, it looks like we are now on our way to 22 23 finally getting the ability and the approvals to take 24 action on the duck pond. It was something that I 25 promised the residents of Ridgewood and Paramus,

1	because it straddles the border. I will be reaching
2	out to the new mayor of Ridgewood to give him the
3	latest update, but I wanted to let all the
4	Freeholders know that we are now well on our way to
5	rectify that, that there's a structural problem
6	there, and, in order to fix that structural problem,
7	you all voted to put money into the capital budget to
8	fix that, and I want to let you know that we're on
9	our way to that.
10	But let me end by this. The parks
11	wouldn't be the way they are without the people that
12	run the parks, from the Director, Jim Koth, all the
13	way down to every single person that cuts the grass,
14	that picks up the garbage, that cleans the comfort
15	stations, but allows the experience for the people
16	that go there to be a wonderful experience. So I
17	want to take this opportunity to thank the employees
18	of the parks system, because they're the true heroes
19	in Parks. It shows that when you care about the
20	employees and you care about what they do everyday,
21	that they will turn around and do a good job for you,
22	and that's what we have with our parks employees.
23	So by strengthening our parks system,
24	we're investing in a stronger, healthier future for
25	all the residents of Bergen County.

13 1 So thank you, Freeholder Chairwoman --ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: Thank you, 2 3 County Executive. COUNTY EXECUTIVE TEDESCO: -- for 4 5 giving me this opportunity to address you and to address the public about our parks. I'm honored and 6 7 thrilled that we get to recognize the time that those folks put in to make our parks system a wonderful 8 9 place, and the zoo is part of that, you know. I 10 don't want to make it so that it's so different, but 11 it is different. And those employees there, they do 12 an outstanding job. 13 ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: They really 14 do. 15 COUNTY EXECUTIVE TEDESCO: And they're 16 making that now a state-of-the-art facility. Ιt 17 always was, but we're actually growing it. It's 18 becoming a much, much more interesting and exciting zoo. We'll be opening, as I said, on Friday. And 19 20 then right after that, we'll be opening another 21 exhibit, and those are just the beginning of the things that are happening in the zoo. 22 23 So thank you, Vice-Chairwoman. 24 ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: Thank you so 25 much. We on the Freeholder Board all support you and

1 we support everyone in the Parks Department. We take great pride in our parks. 2 3 I have two daughters, they're getting 4 older now, but I used to use the parks throughout the 5 county, from when I lived in Palisades Park, at Overpeck, bringing them to the horses and seeing the 6 7 horses and everything else, coming up here to Van Saun Park as I went into Emerson, and everything 8 9 about it from there to the golf courses to the zoo. 10 And thank you to all the employees, because they take 11 great pride and we all take great pride in our parks. And it's great to have everyone, the residents of 12 13 Bergen, to stay in Bergen County, especially with all 14 this traffic throughout these weekends, you want them to stay here to enjoy it. It just is beautiful. 15 We 16 have so much acreage, and I just want to thank you. 17 Freeholder Zur. 18 FREEHOLDER SILNA ZUR: Thank you, Madam 19 Chair. 20 So, underscoring what the Chairwoman 21 said, none of us on this Board question the value of our parks. We know the quality of life that they 22 23 enhance. While we may question an expenditure or a 24 language or a process, we are so onboard with the 25 vision and the positive way that this administration

1 has really engaged the community in moving our parks forward. You know, whether it has been creating real 2 3 social opportunities, real sense of community, 4 wellness opportunities for so many different aspects 5 of our community, what this administration has done, what we've all worked towards, has been really 6 7 amazing. And, you know, the evolution and the vision you have for it going forward is really so 8 9 meaningful. And while our parks and rec department 10 may not be as comical as the one that we can see on 11 TV, they are far, far more dedicated and we are so blessed to have such incredible employees and such 12 individuals with dedication and vision in that 13 14 department. 15 So, County Executive, thank you for blazing the way, and we will continue to question 16 17 those expenditures and those processes and those 18 procedures. 19 FREEHOLDER AMOROSO: You can count on 20 us. 21 FREEHOLDER SILNA ZUR: Because we are also onboard with making sure our parks can be the 22 23 best that they absolutely can be. 24 Thank you. 25 COUNTY EXECUTIVE TEDESCO: Thank you,

16 1 Freeholders. 2 FREEHOLDER AMOROSO: Thanks, Jim. COUNTY EXECUTIVE TEDESCO: I have one 3 4 other update, if we can do it all together. ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: Do it. 5 COUNTY EXECUTIVE TEDESCO: So I wanted 6 7 to let the Freeholders know that we've agreed in 8 principle to have Rutgers manage our Medical 9 Examiner's Office. 10 FREEHOLDER VOSS: Great. Great. 11 ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: Excellent. 12 FREEHOLDER VOSS: That is great. COUNTY EXECUTIVE TEDESCO: So there 13 14 will be a contract coming shortly. Julien has worked 15 outstandingly. I mean, I have to give him the credit 16 for this. We should have them onboard by the middle 17 of August. FREEHOLDER SILNA ZUR: That's awesome! 18 19 COUNTY EXECUTIVE TEDESCO: And we will 20 still get to choose the Medical Examiner, but it will 21 be an employee of Rutgers. And even the things that I knew were so beneficial and where we were getting 22 23 so much more out of this, the other day when we sat -- with the dean? 24 ACTING COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR NEALS: We 25

1 sat with the dean, yes, of the forensic pathology group, Dr. Chen Liu, who had presented to you 2 previously, and also with their counsel. 3 4 COUNTY EXECUTIVE TEDESCO: And legal 5 counsel. And they actually gave us some more detail behind this, where we're actually going to have a 6 7 wonderful staff of professionals there that is just going to be amazing, both from an operational 8 9 standpoint of the facility and the learning 10 environment that's going to be provided there for 11 Rutgers. This is truly remarkable, and I believe, as we said before, that this will be the model that the 12 13 state will go by, and I believe that it's a model 14 that will be looked at nationwide. I wanted to let 15 you all know, we will be putting something out shortly on it. You will be getting the contract to 16 17 approve, but I wanted to give you the good news. 18 FREEHOLDER VOSS: That's great. 19 COUNTY EXECUTIVE TEDESCO: But I need 20 to really thank Julien for making this happen. Ιt 21 never would have happened without Julien, absolutely never would have happened. 22 23 FREEHOLDER AMOROSO: Thank you, Julien. ACTING COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR NEALS: It's 24 25 an exciting opportunity.

1 On top of the educational end, we're actually targeting things like accreditation for the 2 ME's Office. There's just a lot of exciting stuff 3 4 that the Rutgers group has brought forth for the 5 potential of the office, so we should be bringing even better, more news in solidifying all these 6 7 things shortly. 8 FREEHOLDER SILNA ZUR: So when are we 9 anticipating day one? 10 ACTING COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR NEALS: Day 11 one could be anywhere from mid August to early September. 12 FREEHOLDER GANZ: What will the fiscal 13 14 effect be in the fourth quarter? COUNTY EXECUTIVE TEDESCO: I think the 15 16 fiscal effect, we'll be able to manage, David. Ι 17 don't think there will be that much of a difference. 18 The long-term benefits with what we may be able to do from an expanding state of opportunity really is the 19 20 thing that is really encouraging and will bring the 21 ability to probably have less of a cost because of those things that we may be able to partner and do 22 with them for others. 23 24 FREEHOLDER VOSS: Very good. 25 ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: It's very

19 1 exciting. I look forward to it. 2 COUNTY EXECUTIVE TEDESCO: Thank you, Vice-Chairwoman. 3 ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: Thank you. 4 5 REVIEW OF RESOLUTIONS ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: We will now 6 7 review the resolutions to be voted on tonight. MS. RODRIGUEZ: Resolutions #668-18 8 9 through #712-18, and note that there is a slight 10 revision to #674-18. 11 ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: We will now 12 review the ordinances to be voted on tonight. 13 MS. RODRIGUEZ: Chairwoman? 14 ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: We have to go 15 over them. Sorry. 16 MS. RODRIGUEZ: We can start on Page 2, 17 is #668-18. 18 19 #669-18. 20 FREEHOLDER SILNA ZUR: Madam 21 Chairwoman, may I sponsor #669 and #670? 22 FREEHOLDER AMOROSO: I will co-sponsor. 23 FREEHOLDER SILNA ZUR: Can I also 24 suggest that we do #671 as a Body of the Whole? 25 ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: Yes.

20 1 Any objection? 2 (No response.) MS. RODRIGUEZ: Page 4. 3 ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: We have 4 5 several grants. FREEHOLDER AMOROSO: We have a lot of 6 7 grants. You want to do those all Body of the Whole? FREEHOLDER SILNA ZUR: At least #673 8 9 and #674, usually those two for sure. 10 ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: Yes. 11 MS. RODRIGUEZ: Page 5. 12 FREEHOLDER AMOROSO: Could I sponsor the historical commission or do you want to do that 13 as Body of the Whole? 14 15 ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: We can do it 16 as a Body of the Whole. 17 FREEHOLDER AMOROSO: Okay. We have #676 also --18 19 FREEHOLDER SILNA ZUR: Yes. 20 FREEHOLDER AMOROSO: -- is a grant, so 21 Body of the Whole? 22 ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: Body of the 23 Whole. 24 And I think #679 as well. 25 FREEHOLDER SILNA ZUR: #678 is a grant.

21 1 MS. RODRIGUEZ: Page 6. FREEHOLDER AMOROSO: Yes. 2 3 ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: #678. FREEHOLDER VOSS: #679. 4 5 FREEHOLDER AMOROSO: And #680. ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: They're all 6 7 grants. 8 MS. RODRIGUEZ: Page 7. 9 FREEHOLDER SILNA ZUR: Madam 10 Chairwoman, can I sponsor #682? ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: I will 11 12 sponsor that with you. 13 FREEHOLDER SILNA ZUR: And I would like 14 to sponsor #684. 15 FREEHOLDER AMOROSO: I'll co-sponsor. FREEHOLDER VOSS: #685 is grant too. 16 17 FREEHOLDER AMOROSO: #685. ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: I would like 18 19 to sponsor #683. 20 FREEHOLDER SILNA ZUR: I'll co-sponsor 21 that with you. 22 MS. RODRIGUEZ: Page 8. 23 ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: We also have 24 a grant on #685. 25 FREEHOLDER AMOROSO: And #686.

1 ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: Body as a 2 Whole? FREEHOLDER AMOROSO: And #687, it looks 3 like. So the three of them? 4 5 ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: Sure. FREEHOLDER SILNA ZUR: I have no 6 7 objection. 8 MS. RODRIGUEZ: Page 9. 9 FREEHOLDER SILNA ZUR: I'm sorry to 10 backtrack for one second. I had one question on 11 #679. I apologize. It's on Page 6. I just realized 12 it. It's the Mental Health Law Project. How many 13 cases are heard annually by the mental health Law 14 Project? 15 ACTING COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR NEALS: Well, probably anywhere --16 17 MR. AZMAR: Over 400. ACTING COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR NEALS: I 18 19 was about to say three to 500 cases. 20 MR. AZMAR: And we resolve about 200 a 21 year. 22 ACTING COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR NEALS: And 23 that's five attorneys? 24 MR. AZMAR: No, it's two full-time and 25 one part-time.

1 ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: Two full, one part-time? 2 MR. AZMAR: Well, including the 3 4 director, yeah, it's two and a half. 5 FREEHOLDER SILNA ZUR: It's a busy office. 6 7 MR. AZMAR: Yes, it's a very busy office. 8 9 ACTING COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR NEALS: 10 Incredibly busy office. 11 MR. AZMAR: And each lawyer has roughly 12 about 140 cases. 13 FREEHOLDER VOSS: Wow! ACTING COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR NEALS: And 14 their cases aren't limited to Bergen County. 15 16 MR. AZMAR: No, they travel. FREEHOLDER SILNA ZUR: But Bergen 17 18 County residents. 19 ACTING COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR NEALS: 20 Bergen County residents, right. We could have cases 21 pending in any number of areas. 22 FREEHOLDER SILNA ZUR: It is critical 23 for the wraparound care too that we're trying to 24 provide. ACTING COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR NEALS: Yes. 25

1 Absolutely. 2 FREEHOLDER SILNA ZUR: Thank you very 3 much. I apologize for the backtrack. I am getting used to this format. 4 5 ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: I know. I'm like just catching up. 6 7 So we're up to #689? 8 FREEHOLDER SILNA ZUR: Page 10. 9 FREEHOLDER AMOROSO: I wanted to ask a 10 question about #690. 11 ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: They have to go out to bid with that. 12 FREEHOLDER AMOROSO: That's it. 13 ACTING COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR NEALS: Can 14 15 you speak to it? 16 MR. REINER: Yes. 17 FREEHOLDER VOSS: Tell us about the red wolf exhibit. 18 19 MR. REINER: I mean, to the extent of 20 which I know, we're just the administer of the 21 bidding process, what happens when bids were originally received, they were just over the cost 22 23 estimate, so we put them back out to bid. We received new bids. I believe the new bids were 24 25 acceptable for the Parks Department, and we're

25 1 prepping the resolution to go on at the next meeting, whenever it is to schedule. 2 3 I apologize for just kind of fumbling 4 there. 5 FREEHOLDER AMOROSO: No, no, we get the 6 drift. ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: Thank you. 7 8 MR. REINER: Okay. 9 ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: Okay. Next 10 page. 11 MS. RODRIGUEZ: We're on Page 10. 12 ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: Page 11. 13 Page 12. 14 Page 13. 15 I am so excited about the repaving 16 program. They're doing Soldier Hill. It is very 17 exciting. They already milled it in these past two 18 days. It's going to be paved, I guess, starting 19 tomorrow. 20 FREEHOLDER SILNA ZUR: This is really 21 significant. 22 ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: It really is 23 significant throughout all the different towns. I'm 24 just in the Pascack Valley, the past three weeks 25 there has been a lot of work being done, resurfacing.

26 1 FREEHOLDER SILNA ZUR: In Bergenfield too. 2 3 ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: That's right 4 in Bergenfield on Washington Avenue. FREEHOLDER SILNA ZUR: Do you have a 5 list in general of all the different roads that are 6 7 going to be paved? ACTING COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR NEALS: Yes. 8 9 Absolutely. 10 FREEHOLDER SILNA ZUR: That would be 11 wonderful just to have. ACTING COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR NEALS: 12 13 We'll have Tom Connolly get it to you. FREEHOLDER SILNA ZUR: That would be 14 wonderful to have. 15 COUNTY EXECUTIVE TEDESCO: Freeholder, 16 17 if I can just expand on that one second. 18 We're going to give you a list, but 19 that list changes, because it depends on who can get 20 their curb cuts done and things like that. But as 21 Julien said, Tom has a list. We can tell you which ones have been done this year, and we can tell you 22 23 which ones are looking to be scheduled for the 24 remainder of the year. 25 But understand that --

1 FREEHOLDER GANZ: Okay. 2 MR. FLORIO: So we have a motion and a 3 second, and there's been a voice call --4 FREEHOLDER AMOROSO: Right. 5 MR. FLORIO: -- on going into Closed Session. So we are now in Closed Session. 6 7 (Closed Session commences at 5:12 p.m.) 8 (Open Session resumes at 5:50 p.m.) 9 (Freeholder Tanelli arrived during 10 Closed Session.) 11 MR. FLORIO: On the record, Chairwoman. 12 ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: Okay. We 13 will reconvene for our Public Meeting at 7:30 p.m. 14 There being nothing further to come 15 before this meeting, may I have a motion to adjourn? FREEHOLDER GANZ: So moved. 16 17 FREEHOLDER VOSS: So moved. FREEHOLDER SILNA ZUR: Second. 18 19 ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: All in favor? 20 (All present Freeholders respond in the 21 affirmative.) 22 ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: Opposed? 23 (No response.) ACTING CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: 24 We are adjourned at 5:50 p.m. 25
