1 MR. DRESSLER: Good evening. Raymond W. Dressler, for the record, 2 Director of Public Works, County of Bergen. 4 FREEHOLDER TANELLI: Thank you. 5 CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: Thank you, Mr. 6 Dressler. FREEHOLDER ZUR: This is a pretty 7 8 amazing move and is once again Bergen County 9 innovating problem solving, so if you can just give 10 us a two-minute --11 MR. DRESSLER: Sure. 12 This gives us the ability to start a 13 Construction Code Department, commonly referred to as 14 a Building Department in the municipality. Right now 15 -- well, up until a couple of weeks ago, only a 16 municipality or the state could conduct building 17 inspections and plan review. We had legislation go 18 through the Assembly and the Senate unanimously, and 19 then the Governor signed it, I believe it was on the 17th of this month. 20 21 COUNTY EXECUTIVE TEDESCO: December. MR. DRESSLER: So, moving forward, the 22 23 process is to bring it to you and pass the resolution

that we will send to the Department of Community

Affairs that will allow us to establish a code

24

department. So we will have the ability to do our own plan review in-house and do our own inspections, and this will cut down dramatically on the time that it takes to get plans done and inspections done through municipalities, and it also will alleviate a municipality from doing our work that they don't get paid for.

The county is exempt from fees. So, although they come out and they do our inspections and our plan review, they receive no funding. So it's a drain on their system as well, because their employees are servicing us. So, we'll be able to do that in-house. And this is a PILOT program. The only county in the state that's been approved is Bergen.

CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: Wow, that's great!

FREEHOLDER VOSS: I have a question.

The people who do the inspections, they have to go
through a licensing procedure, from what I remember,
when I was on the licensing board, and there are very
few persons who have these licenses, and it's very
difficult for people who want to get licenses to get
work. So my bottom line is, will we be hiring some
of these people?

MR. DRESSLER: We will be hiring some

1 of these people. It's not an easy process. FREEHOLDER VOSS: I know. MR. DRESSLER: I'm a licensed 4 construction official for 25 years, so it helps. 5 we'll be building our department as we go. FREEHOLDER GANZ: If a person in the 6 7 Planning Department is performing work, labor, and services, is it possible that they could go to some 9 other person who is working for the county and get a 10 different result than a person who is working for or 11 on behalf of the county versus the town? 12 MR. DRESSLER: Well, the towns would no 13 longer be doing our projects. We'll be doing all our 14 own projects. So there will be one, what's called a 15 "subcode official" that will oversee each discipline, 16 whether that's fire, building, electric, plumbing or 17 elevator, that would be the person in charge. 18 FREEHOLDER GANZ: Would you have two people different on the --19 20 MR. DRESSLER: Discipline? 21 FREEHOLDER GANZ: Various disciplines doing the same work? 22 23 MR. DRESSLER: It is possible. Many 24 people are multi-licensed, yes.

MR. DRESSLER: Correct. 16 17 FREEHOLDER SULLIVAN: So now we're just 18 going to do the inspection? 19 MR. DRESSLER: That's correct. 20 FREEHOLDER SULLIVAN: Is there any 21 preparation that's, like you said, that the town had to prepare things or nothing other than the normal 22 23 standard operating procedure has to be done, right? 24 MR. DRESSLER: Correct. Correct.
