11 My name is Janet Glass.

I'm a leader in the GreenFaith organization. The GreenFaith organization is a coalition of faith organizations that are working

15 around the environment. We are: Temple Emeth in

16 Teaneck, Church of Good Shepherd, Grace Lutheran

17 Church, Covenant Ministries, a Buddhist global

18 relief. I'm sure I've forgot some, but there are

19 eight congregations that are here representing.

20 And I'm with a coalition of other

21 | environmental leaders who are also waiting to speak.

22 We are here to talk about the Meadowlands power

23 | plant, it's also known as the North Bergen Liberty

24 | Generating Plant, and we'll be presenting you with

25 | some information. We will also be asking you to put

1 | a resolution on your agenda for next week.

This fracked gas plant, if it's built, would become one of the largest sources of air pollution and greenhouse gases in the State of New Jersey.

Now, where I live, I live in

North Bergen, and I live not far from where this

plant would be built. I have grandchildren, I have a

two-year-old, a four-year-old, a six-year-old, and

the air quality in that neighborhood is already rated

F by the American Lung Association.

Bergen County is not better than that.

And this ground level ozone and all of the air pollution that would be generated from this plant would double the health risks for my grandkids.

There are 46 towns already in Bergen County that have come out passing resolutions in opposition to this power plant. We are calling on you to do the same and to put a resolution on your agenda for next week.

We're going to be back with some citizens and some mayors to talk with you at this time next week.

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    Buddy Jenssen, Chairman, North Jersey Sierra Club.
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                   You know all about us.
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                   I'm going to be very brief.
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                   I'm a rabid Democrat, okay, and we

    supported you guys, we had about 300 or 400
25
    environmental people out in the field knocking on
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doors and getting votes. Now I'm coming to you guys
for your help.

We need powerful people to be on our side, because this power plant is just ridiculous. The power is going to go to New York City, right? There's three more power plants online, seven pipelines, right? So we need your support. So we urge you to sign the resolution on March 6th.

Any questions?

MR. JENSSEN: We will be going there. They know us there too as well.

But, guys, this is the air that we breathe, you know what I mean? This is our kids' air. You know, this has nothing to do with politics, right? And, listen, I'm a union guy, I was a stagehand in Local 1, right, so I support the unions 100 percent, but the union guys should be doing solar panels and wind turbines and refitting all the structures that we need.

FREEHOLDER SULLIVAN: That's a discussion for another day, because you can't compare to the amount of power generated with solar power and

- wind turbines. It doesn't even compare.

  MR. JENSSEN: But we don't even need
- 3 the power. The power is going to go to New York
  4 City.
- FREEHOLDER SULLIVAN: The power in
  Ridgefield is going to New York as well. I don't
  know if you're aware of that.
- MR. JENSSEN: Right, and they're only separated by one mile.
- 10 Like Janet said, the air pollution is 11 rated F.
- FREEHOLDER SULLIVAN: You were aware,
  though, right, that they send power from Public
  Service in Ridgefield to New York? You're aware of
  that, right?
- MR. JENSSEN: Sure, sure, I know. And what do we gain by it, though?
- FREEHOLDER SULLIVAN: That's another

  discussion. It just seems that no one was aware that

  Ridgefield produces power for New York as well.
- MR. JENSSEN: Yeah, only when they need it, though, yeah, on demand.
- Okay. Thank you.
- MS. WORTHINGTON: Hi. My name is
- 25 Cassandra Worthington. I'm with Food & Water Watch.

Janet spoke about the compounding health effects of putting a gas plant one mile from the PSE&G plant. I want to go into what that would look like for your constituents.

This plant will emit hundreds of tons of pollutants annually, including particulate matter, toxic chemicals and carcinogens such as benzene and Formaldehyde. We know all of these things, what they lead to, respiratory illnesses, cancers.

But going beyond that, we're talking about specific populations that are in jeopardy of health effects, specifically developing fetuses and children.

The DEP has already issued wetlands and flood hazard permits, and they are now reviewing the applicant's air quality permits.

We urge you to take a stance against the power plant by passing the resolution for next week's meeting.

And as of why it's important for Bergen County, you know, we've talked about the 46 towns that have passed their own resolutions against the power plant, and, you know, we talk about the radius of this plant, it's hitting Bergen County towns and specifically the areas that already have

failing ozone levels. And these are our most

vulnerable populations, and we really need to protect

them.

MR. DOLSKY: Good afternoon. My name is Ken Dolsky. I'm with the Don't Gass the Meadowlands Coalition.

I'd like to talk to you a little bit about the 800-pound gorilla that's sitting in this room that generally has a lot of control over whether projects like this get built or not, and that's union jobs. And we talked about this with the Pilgrim Pipeline issue.

We understand the sensitivity of the Bergen Freeholders and Gov. Murphy for the need for jobs and the political power of the construction trades in Bergen County. And, like I said, we saw you struggle with this issue with the Pilgrim Pipeline. And we understand the importance of jobs. We all need jobs. But we cannot support environmental and public health disasters just because they produce some jobs.

We hope that you're open to a way out of this conundrum that is better for all than a very

weak resolution.

"Empower New Jersey," and we just demonstrated to the Murphy administration that allowing 12 planned fossil fuel projects that are on the drawing board right now, including this Meadowlands power plant, allowing them to proceed will make it impossible for him to meet his clean energy goals, because it would increase greenhouse gases in the state by 32 percent at a time when he's trying to cut it.

These projects will harm the health and welfare of the people of this state, with virtually no benefit. And the governor is between a rock and a hard place, between unions and keeping his word to cut greenhouse gas and fight climate change. So what we propose was a carrot and stick approach that we hope the governor will take.

The stick is to declare a moratorium on new fossil fuel projects and put in place the means to regulate greenhouse gases in line with the administration's goals and laws like the Global Warming Response Act. Effectively this is saying to the unions, we just can't continue to build fossil fuel projects because of the impact on our world, including our health and welfare and that of them and

their families.

The carrot is that there are far more jobs in clean energy per unit of energy than in the fossil fuel world. And I will give you my notes with a number of examples.

Fossil fuel projects may look

attractive to unions in the long-term, but they are

long-term job killers, because, once built, they

don't need much labor to operate and they prevent

competition from green technology, which requires

more maintenance and ongoing operational workers per

unit of energy output.

So, our proposed solution is to have the administration develop a very strong green jobs program, including training and placement in the new green economy with a just transition for displaced fossil fuel workers. That must include credible demonstration of the existence of many green jobs and the willingness on the part of the governor to make a grand bargain with the unions that will convince the unions to accept this. It will also be helpful if the counties and municipalities help the governor see this opportunity and help him make it a reality.

MR. FLORIO: Three minutes.

MR. DOLSKY: So we're calling on you to

oppose the Meadowlands power plant and help the governor take this step.

I will leave you a lot of information.

And our objective is to influence the governor in all this. That's how we're looking for your help. He's the one who is going to make the call on this.

FREEHOLDER TANELLI: I just want to note for the record that you made some assumptions tonight in regards to the pipeline and our struggling with the pipeline at the time.

If you recall, nothing was going on with the pipeline except the county had issued a couple of survey permits to people that were interested in doing the pipeline, and, at the same time, we were struggling with a situation where we had fuel trains coming through the county without any identification on what was on those trains.

So this Board was struggling not only with the pipelines, but with the trains. But there was never any comments by this Board that we were struggling over any type of union work or union labor, it was strictly an environmental situation where that pipeline may have jeopardized some Clean Water quality, and, more specifically, in Mahwah.

I just wanted to make sure the record reflects that I don't appreciate your assertion in the beginning that the reason we were struggling with the pipeline was because of union contracts, when that's never been discussed by this Board.

MR. DOLSKY: It was our assumption, and you passed the weakest resolution of any that we had on the Pilgrim Pipeline.

FREEHOLDER TANELLI: And the pipeline didn't get built and it didn't get relocated, and this Board took it seriously from day one.

Thank you.

the driving factor, because they're not.

I just want to add for the record too that I don't

know why the unions are being brought into this.

This is something that Hudson County is involved in.

I don't know why you continue to say the unions are

This will be done whether it's approved by the DEP, the governor, whomever, and I think you're just giving the unions a bad name, and that's something I take offense to.

We're very educated people, and you

1 make your decisions and we make ours, but there's also a lot of misconceptions of how to produce power in this area where land is limited.

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- You want to continue to talk about solar plants and windmills. You tell me where to put them, where you can put a windmill, other than where it's right now, in Atlantic City. It takes a lot of space and it costs a lot of energy to produce those.
- 9 So I wanted just for the record to say 10 the union is not the driving force on whether this 11 gets built or not.
- 12 MR. DOLSKY: Unions have come out very 13 strongly in favor of this plant.
- 14 FREEHOLDER SULLIVAN: You had your 15 three minutes and I didn't interrupt you.
- I made my statement. You can agree 16 17 with it or you don't agree with it.
- 18 MR. FLORIO: Mr. Dolsky, your three 19 minutes have expired.
- 20 CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: Yes, please.

Bergen County.

So, my name is Matt Smith. 22 23 senior organizer with Food & Water Watch. We 24 represent 40,000 members in New Jersey, 7,000 here in 25

It's nice to be back in front of the Freeholder Board. I see some familiar faces, and I think we did work together on the Pilgrim Pipeline issue.

And as Freeholder Tanelli expressed, that support from Bergen County was instrumental to stopping that project that endangered the drinking water supply for Bergen County residents.

The Meadowlands power plant is very similar, right? This is power for New York.

We do not need to find ourselves in the position to provide an alternative, because the power is not for us. Yet the pollution impact, regardless of where it's built, just over the line in Hudson County, certainly that pollution plume will be impacting residents, and in no small reason that's why 46 towns now have come out passing strong resolutions. That's 46 of the 70 townships that make up the county. We anticipate that opposition to continue to grow. It also includes now state representatives, Sen. Weinberg, Assemblyman Huttle, Assemblyman Gordon Johnson, and Assemblyman Clinton Calabrese have all come out strongly against this project.

We did go to the North Bergen Township

Council meeting and present our case there. We're
not holding out any great hopes that it will result
in something. And we do plan to also bring the issue
to the Hudson County Freeholders.

There was just a couple of additional points that I wanted to make.

One is that if this power plant is built, it would be the single largest source of climate pollution not only New Jersey, but also in New York State.

Here we are in 2019, we have the U.S.

National Climate Assessment in plain English telling

us that if we build and continue to expand fossil

fuels and greenhouse gas emissions in they state,

that we will be crossing irreversible tipping points

on climate change that would have dramatic

consequences for the future survival of Bergen County

residents.

We don't need to come up with an alternative. This power isn't for us. But there is certainly immense potential, as is for renewable energy development, as is recognized by the governor's Executive Order #28, which commits the state to get to 100 percent renewable energy by the year 2050, as well as legislation passed that

requires the state to source 50 percent of that electricity from renewable sources from 2035.

One piece that's in addition to just

Bergen County sort of using its bully pulpit to weigh
in on this issue that's impacting its residents is
the fact that there's a proposed wastewater treatment
pipeline that would go from the Little Ferry plant to
the power plant in Edgewater and back to cool the
towers for the power plant.

We believe that Bergen County taxpayer money should not be used to facilitate the construction of a power plant that would pollute our air, that the majority of towns are opposed to, and that really serves no long-term benefit for the residents of Bergen County.

We did submit an Open Public Records request to try to better understand the county's role in the pipeline. That was submitted over a month ago, we haven't yet received any documents but we're hopeful.

FREEHOLDER TANELLI: Well, let her finish.

MS. WALSH: I am a little concerned about the parking lot in Area II, and I hope that it's not going to be 300 spaces.

So, beyond that, in 2014, the county negotiated an agreement with the pipeline company to put that pipeline in Ramapo Reservation. Part of the agreement was that the pipeline people would give money to the county to buy replacement land.

So, a couple of months ago I talked to Adam Strobel and I asked him if the land had been purchased yet, and he said no. So I was wondering if there is anything that you can do about it, because that money is sitting in an account, it's been there since 2014.

ACTING COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR NEALS: So with regard to the money, first of all, for whatever land that we purchase, we would determine whether we would want to use Open Space Funds to purchase additional land, but any money that's been received to this point would have been placed in an interest bearing account and we would be earning money on top of that now. So it's not like that we're going to

lose it. They paid it. They were responsible to pay
it for land replacement. But we're going to find
opportunities that we think are in the county's best
interests, and whether we use the Open Space Funds or
whether we use that trust money, it's still there and
available for the county.

MS. WALSH: Oh, sure, I'm not questioning whether it has been spent, because I know that it has not been spent.

FREEHOLDER TANELLI: Chairwoman?

CHAIRWOMAN ORTIZ: Yes.

FREEHOLDER TANELLI: Just two quick points.

One is, we're always looking to acquire open space and enhance our park systems. I mean, Freeholder Zur can tell you the exact amount of acreage that we currently have in the county.

The other thing is, I just wanted to tell you, we didn't make any decisions on the dinosaur relocation. We kept telling everyone that kept coming to the meeting that nothing was ever presented to this Board to make any changes. That's why we kept telling you, as you guys were coming up saying make sure you don't vote for it, there was nothing put before us to vote on. And the County

Executive now has suspended any discussions on that for the time being. So I appreciate you thanking us, but you're thanking us for doing nothing.

MS. WALSH: Okay.

So, regarding the money, though, that's in that special account, is there any way that that could be rolled -- because what Mr. Strobel told me is that it's a very small amount of money in terms of purchase power in the county. So what I'm thinking is, if it could be rolled into some other kind of purchase, you know, because we deserve to have that land replaced, where the pipeline destroyed all those trees.

guess what I'm saying is that there's no rush necessarily to spend that money, because as open space or other lands become available, we have resources available to address that. So especially in light of the fact that this money may not be significant in terms of the amount, in terms of purchase power or anything else, we have Open Space, we have other resources available. So whether we roll that money over, that's not going to delay in any way our ability to find replacement land for what was lost at the pipeline.

MR. FLORIO: Your time has expired, that's all I'm telling you. Your time for speaking has expired.

MS. WALSH: Oh, thank you. I thought you were talking about the money.

MR. FLORIO: No.

ACTING COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR NEALS: As you go back to your seat, just be assured that that is not holding us back from being able to find and purchase replacement land for that. Wherever we see opportunities to purchase land, we can use our Open Space Funds, whether we touch that money or not, it may be in a great interest bearing account that's ahead of where the market is today, so we're actually getting more bang out of our buck for that money. So I don't want you to be overly concerned with that money.

MS. WALSH: I won't. I'm only concerned about the land, not the money.

ACTING COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR NEALS:

Right, and so are we, that's why Freeholder Zur has all those thousands of acres that we're buying, and whether you want to consider that replacing what we lost or otherwise, it's still land that we're finding, constantly recapturing land.

So that's already a priority of ours, which is not impacted by that account that came in connection with the pipeline.

Administrator, one of the things, though, that may be helpful for the administration to put together is a breakdown of all of the land that we have purchased in the last four years with our Open Space dollars, so that we can have an actual number to demonstrate, I mean, the 9,003 -- whatever acres that we have.

In addition to that, we are providing constant dollars both to municipalities as well as to the county portfolio as well as increasing the preservation of open space, and I think that having those numbers demonstrable might be helpful to be able to show.
